Building on our discussions about prayer, the youth group has begun to explore the meaning of The Lord's Prayer. We viewed paintings and drawings illustrating how "Our Father in Heaven" has been imagined. Next we explored how people attempt, within our limited human understanding, to find words to describe God. The bulletin board in the Griswold Room shows some of the words we discovered that are used to name God. In the weeks ahead, we will continue to unwrap the themes and concepts in The Lord's Prayer.

With help and guidance from Kathy Kronholm, the youth made small teddy bears to include in the layettes which I took to the Sisters in San Pedro, Dominican Republic. The Sisters were very grateful for the continued support of Saint Ann's to their important ministry in the Barrio.

In early January, the youth group hosted the annual Burning of the Greens. Several very dry Christmas trees and wreaths went quickly up in flames as we watched and sang Christmas carols. It was a cold and windy evening but we were warmed by the enthusiastic group and the hot, mulled apple cider, cocoa and doughnuts served by Mac and Anya.

On Sunday, January 30th the youth group will host a Chapel on the Green service in New Haven. We invite everyone in the congregation to gather in the kitchen at 9:30 that morning to make 100 bagged lunches. The lunches will be distributed to the homeless after the short Eucharist service on the Green.

Money Matters: A Look Back at 2010 **Heather Dillenbeck, Treasurer**

This time last year, it was hard to be optimistic about 2010. Our financial results for 2009 had been disappointing, pledge commitments for 2010 were down significantly, we faced uncertainties in the costs of a new rector and youth minister, and the rectory was in need of significant, expensive repair. Now, looking back, the year turned out pretty well.

Here are a few highlights:

- ◆ During 2010 pledge receipts totaled over \$210,000. This was \$21,000 more than was indicated on the pledge cards for 2010.

- ◆ There were also favorable surprises on the expense side. Most importantly, clergy benefit expense went down during the year, rather than up as we had feared. While we all would have preferred the Rector issue to be settled, the fact is that having Harlon half time, and having both Harlon and Father Bob not needing medical insurance, was hugely helpful.
- ◆ The rectory renovation was completed, and on budget.
- ◆ Unexpected gifts and bequests during the year totaled \$119,000, which we added to the investment account.
- ◆ Late in the year two of the church's paintings were sold, bringing in another \$18,000, which was also added to the investment account.
- ◆ The investment account itself did well, reaching \$2,152,275 at yearend.

What does 2011 have in store for us? I wish I knew. Early results from the pledge drive are disappointing-see Carl Igelbrink's stewardship update below. Many costs seem certain to rise. It could be a very difficult year, or we could be lucky once again. Please, if you haven't yet sent in your pledge, do so now.

The Vestry discussed the budget for 2011 at its meeting on January 19th. A full financial report will be presented at Saint Ann's Annual Meeting on February 13th.

Who ME? Yes US! Carl Igelbrink, Stewardship

The 2011 Pledge Drive is in its last stages. As you know, we did not set a pledge goal this year; relying instead on the belief that each individual gives as an act of love which thereby draws us into a deeper relationship with God and each other.

The results, detailed below, speak for themselves. You will note that the decline in pledge income and pledges has accelerated during this period of transition for Saint Ann's and points out the need to hold and grow behind a new rector.

Search Committee at Work on New Search Bill Cuddy, Chair

The Search Committee has been working on the *new search* for our new rector since **October 2010**.

The initial process started in September of 2009. Two original members of the Committee, *Maggie Faulkner and Linda Winzer*, decided not to continue with the new search. We thank them warmly for their many contributions and views and will miss their help and opinions as we continue.

The first action after the Vestry directed another search was a meeting between the Vestry and the Search Committee to talk about the Vestry's decision. Subsequently the Diocese posted the position opening for 30 days. The Search Committee met during this time to talk about our procedures and inquiries going forward. After the Diocesan deployment officer had reviewed expressions of interest from and talked with priests who responded to the position posting, he met with the Search Committee on **December 1st of 2010** and presented us with initial information on 18 candidates.

On **December 6th** we wrote those candidates to request written answers to some questions and one or more of their sermons, in writing or on a CD or DVD. Twelve responded to our request. The other six withdrew from consideration for one reason or another.

On **January 5th of 2011** we met to consider the responses we had reviewed and decided which of the candidates to interview by telephone. These interviews are scheduled to be completed on **January 24th**. We will then meet to consider the information we have about the candidates and decide which ones we will invite to in-person interviews at Saint Ann's. It appears likely that we will complete those personal interviews, visit some candidates' churches and be prepared to present our recommendations to the Vestry in the **second half of February**.

Share the Journey, Grow in Faith

This year's Christmas Eve service at 5:00 pm included A Liturgy for Christmas Eve, focusing on the Nativity Story as liturgy. This simple yet meaningful presentation is part of the Godly Play curriculum and featured the youth group members reading the story which was punctuated by several familiar Christmas hymns. At designated times, the church school students brought the crèche figures forward to complete the Nativity scene, joining the youth group on the altar. Following a blessing of the crèche, the liturgy culminated with a singing of "Silent Night".

Many thanks to the church school and youth group for their participation in this memorable service, and to the knitters whose beautiful hand knit figures were used in the crèche. It was so nice to have all of Saint Ann's youth sharing the Christmas story with the parish. Thanks also to the parents of these children for their diligence in getting them to the church for rehearsal on December 19th and arriving early on Christmas Eve.

We enjoyed four wonderful stories during the season of Advent which helped the children to anticipate the mystery of Christmas. We moved toward Bethlehem, guided by the prophets, with the Holy Family, the shepherds, and the Magi. With each lesson, we enjoyed the light of the Advent candles for the prophets, for Mary and Joseph, for the shepherds, and for the wise men.

During our work times following the story, the children have been enjoying the most recent additions to the Godly Play room, "The Crosses" and "Books of the Bible." The crosses challenge them to think about what crosses really represent and introduce them to the wide variety of crosses that exist, each a different shape with its own story. The books help the children to learn the books of the Bible and to connect the Godly Play lessons to the written Bible.

Beginning January 16, we launched into the Parables which will complete our winter presentations and bring us up to Lent. The Parable lessons include Parable of the Good Shepherd, Parable of the Good Samaritan, Parable of the Great Pearl, Parable of the Sower, Parable of the Leaven, Parable of the Mustard Seed, and Parable of the Deep Well.

The Godly Play adult volunteers are excited to share the stories with the children as we journey together through the remainder of the church school year, from the Mystery of Christmas all the way to the Mystery of Pentecost. We are grateful for the children who are making the journey with us.

Christian Vocation Onesimus

As much as we dislike the uncertainty of this Interim period it can and should be a valuable time for each of us. Just as our Search Committee takes stock of who we really are as a Faith Community, no less should we parishioners be prompted to examine our own Christian profile.

By happy coincidence, this last week brought the latest issue of the Holy Cross News, whose theme is Vocation. In his forward, the Superior of the Order shared the following valuable insight: “each Christian-every human being has a vocation. By that I mean each of us has a particular set of opportunities and circumstances that uniquely fit us to serve and glorify God in a way no one else ever did or can. In that meeting between personal character and vital opportunity, lived out with fidelity, constancy and creativity over time, we find our true selves - we discover our Vocation.”

To see ourselves in this new way and become open to such inner leading as we are meant to do, should undergird our whole Church experience. Not to say that our prior views and engagement in the life of Saint Ann’s become invalid...rather they are judged, amended in the light of becoming increasingly open to God's lead, will, and plan for our own discipleship .

As to what awaits this deepening dependency on God, St. Luke gives us these blessed assurances: “ask and it will be given you...seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks, receives...he who seeks, finds...and to him who knocks, the door will be opened.” Thanks be to God!

What better way to conduct our own interimcy than to explore our true Vocation. Amen!

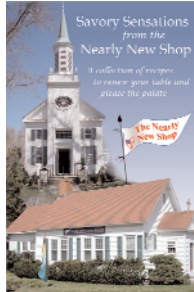
